

#### How to Follow Baseball

- The OBJECT is to win the game by scoring the most runs in nine innings.
- 2.—A RUN is scored when a batter becomes a baserunner and makes a complete circuit of the bases—First, Second, Third and Home.
- 3.—An INNINGS is composed of a time at bat and a time in the field for each team, having three outs while at bat, and making three putouts in the field. The visiting team bats first in the (top of) the innings, the home team last.
- 4. A BATTER is out if; caught out; thrown out at first base; struck out; touched by a fairly batted ball; or if he bats from outside the batter's box. The batter MUST TRY to reach first base on any fairly batted ball.
- 5.—A BATTER may become a baserunner by a safe hit (single, double, triple, or home run); base on balls; being hit by a pitched ball; error; fielder's choice; or catcher interference.
- 6.—A BASERUNNER may advance: on a fairly batted ball; by stealing a base during the pitch; after a fly ball is caught; on a balk committed by the pitcher; or through interference.
- 7.—A BASERUNNER is OUT if; forced out; tagged with the ball while off base; touched by a fairly batted ball; or declared out for interference.
- 8.—A pitched ball is a STRIKE on the batter if: he swings; if it is in the STRIKE ZONE (across home plate between batter's knees and shoulders); or if he hits a foul ball except for the third strike. Three strikes and you're out.
- 9.—Four balls (which the batter does not swing at) outside the strike zone constitute a BASE on BALLS or a WALK to first base.
- 10.—A baserunner is FORCED OUT if a fielder with the ball touches the base the runner is obliged to reach because of another runner behind him.
- 11.—A pitcher commits a BALK when he breaks the rules on legal pitching procedure; baserunners advance one base.
- 12.—The complete and official Rules of Baseball are complex, multifarious and constantly open to reinterpretation and revision. Even though they are apparently comprehensive, nearly every day umpires are called upon to make decisions not directly covered by the rules.

## Northern Stars to Watch Today

The players representing the North have been selected from teams in Liverpool, Hull, Birmingham and Manchester and the key men include . . . .

WALLY O'NEIL of Stretford, is player manager of the squad, hails from Windsor, Ontario, and has done a tremendous amount of work for the game in this country. He is also an outstanding performer either as a pitcher, in fielder or hitter.

**DICK HAMMOND** of Hull Aces, represented England against Holland last season, at the Crystal Palace, is a good hitter and excellent centre-fielder.

HUGHIE KING of Liverpool Aces, one of the best third basemen in the game, has also played for England.

JOHN "ROCKY" COLLINS, of Stretford, dubbed the nonsecret weapon of the Saints by sportswriters. He is one of the most vociferous of players as well as most dangerous with a bat. Look out for him coming up when runs are needed! Represented England last season.

JOHNNY BARRASS of Stretford, a very experienced and versatile player, he can pitch, play first base or the outfield and is a current England choice.

STAN WINDROSS of Stretford, is manager of the league champions Saints and a dangerous left handed hitter. He is a Canadian from Galt, Ontario.

FRANK PARKER of Hull Aces, very strong hitter and outfielder, he played for England last season.

BARRY COURT of Birmingham, plays first base, and is a powerful home run hitter; another English international.

### BASEBALL IN ENGLAND

It surprises many people to know that this very American of games has been played here since the late 19th Century when touring teams played at Lords!

It enjoyed quite a boom until the outbreak of the Second World War, when it was being played here on a semi-pro basis. The war was a great set back and progress since has been slow, until the last few years, when the National Baseball League was born, and this game is the fruits of that venture.

Stretford Saints from Manchester, are the current champions of the National League, and both they and rivals Hull Aces, have played in Holland in the last few years, where the game is on a much larger basis and they have U.S. coaches and very fine facilities.

At Stretford on Turn Moss Fields, Edge Lane, home of the National League champions — Stretford Saints.

They play at home on Sundays, and also have a junior team — the Angels, to which any youngsters are welcome, who would like to learn the game.

Saints have played continuously since 1947, and have had great success, especially during the last three seasons, when they have won the National League championship on each occasion.
