


Welcome to the ninth annual invitational tournament to be put on by the Crawley Giants.



The new town of Crawley was conceived and started nearly forty years ago. Before that it was virtually a sleepy village half-way between London and Brighton. It had once been a stop for stage coaches and had very little else going for it.

Then came the building boom to help house those made homeless through the war and Crawley mushroomed. Baseball arrived with the new town.

Originally the Crawley team was a factory side of an American drug company (The Beechams Magpies) which moved onto the industrial estate, the baseball pitch was inside the factory grounds.

Then the teams that were the forerunners of the present day Giants moved away from the factory and played on more public pitches eventually arriving at the name trawley Giants and basing themselves at Southgate.

About the Gladiators

The University Gladiators is a team that came into existence during the Dutch student championships in Groningen in 1984.

On the first day of the tournament seven University teams played for the title of University champion. On the second day a selection was made from all the players to form The University Gladiators. Alas the newborn team had a difficult first day for their first opponent was the London Allstar team. The new team could not get acquainted to the devastating pitching of the Allstars. Only Mario Everts saved us from embarrasment by hitting two solo homers, the only two runs against the 22 run lead by the Allstar side. Mario was the tournaments top hitter with five homers in four games.

At present the University Gladiators is composed of players playing in the Dutch central region league. Three teams are contributing players to todays side. They are The Rats from Utrecht, Quick from Amersfoort and The Matchmakers from Wageningen and the players play in the upper two regional leagues.

There are two players who have played at a higher level. Mike Ocon has played professional baseball in the U.S.A. and Nico de Jong has played on a national level in Holland. The Gladiators do not play regularly together, but have reformed especially for this tournament.

.....Tourney Trivia.....

In the "Who's on first?" comedy sketch that Bud Abbott and Lou Costello made famous, the name of one player - the right fielder - was routinely omitted. Names in the rest of the lineup where;

First base - Who Second base - What Third base - I Don't know Shortstop - I Don't care Left field - Why Center field - Because

Catcher - Today Pitcher - Tomorrow

Ross Barnes was a second baseman for Chicago's National league team, and he slugged the first home run in major league history on May 2, 1876.

The longest major league game played all on one day went into the books on 1 May, 1920 at Boston Braves field. The Brooklyn Dodgers couldn't push a run across for 21 innings; the Braves had no result after 20. Ultimately 26 innings were played and the game ended a 1-1 tie.

Most amazing of all, the 2 starting pitchers, Leon Cadore of the Dogers and Joe Oeschger of the Braves, went the whole distance! After throwing the equivalent of 3 full games in one day, both spent several days in bed.

Honus Wagner was the first player ever to endorse a baseball bat.

True or False? Ty Cobb and Stan Musial pitched in the major leagues, It's true - but Musial pitched to just one batter (as a publicity stunt) and Cobb threw only a few games.

BASEBALL - "THE GAME"

Played between two teams of nine on-field players. Substitutes are allowed in every position.

Duration:

Nine innings per side, with three outs per inning. At the end of each inning the batting team fields and vice versa—the team scoring most runs is the winner. A batter is out when he:

- 1. Misses three pitched balls 'strikes'.
- 2. Hits a 'fly ball' that is caught by a fielder.
- Hits a 'fair ball' but fails to reach 1st base before the fielder has possession of the ball with part of his person on 1st base.
- 4. Is 'tagged' by fielder with the ball before he reaches a base.

Batting Order:

Each batsman takes his turn to bat in strict rotation throughout the game.

Strike:

A legally pitched ball crossing the 'home plate' between the batters ampits and knees—'the strike zone'. Each batter is allowed to survive two strikes, he is out if he misses the third.

Ball:

A pitched ball that is outside of the 'strike zone', not struck at by the batter four such 'balls' and the batter is allowed to go to first base (he becomes a base-runner). 'A ball' struck at becomes a 'strike'.

Hit

A pitched ball hit by a batter into 'fair territory'. The batter is forced to run on hit.

Ely Ball

A hit that goes in the air. If the ball is caught whether fair or foul the batter is out.

Foul Ball:

A hit fly ball that lands outside of the fair territory—the first two foul balls count against the batter (strikes) No base runner is allowed to advance on a foul ball unless the 'fly' is caught—it then becomes a fair ball and the batter is out.

Run:

is scored when a batter/base runner safely completes the circuit of 'the diamond' touching each base in correct order — 1st, 2nd, 3rd base and home plate.

Home Run:

Complete circuit of bases by the batter off one fair hit.

Area of Play (fair territory):

Fair territory is within the boundaries (foul lines) and forward of the 'home plate' through 1st and 3rd bases to the extremities of the ground.

The Infield:

An imaginary arc within 'fair territory' slightly to the rear and forward of the infielders (1st base, 2nd base, shortstop, 3rd base.)

The Outfield:

The remainder of 'fair territory' to the extremities of the playing area.

The Diamond:

The area within the bounds of the bases. Distance between bases is 90 feet.

The Home Plate: Made of white rubber

Pinti Pint

Pitching Distance: 60ft 6in.

Size of Bases:

15 in. square 4 to 5 in. deep

The Ball:

Leather bound, weight 5 to $5\frac{1}{4}$ oz, circumference 9 to $9\frac{1}{4}$ in, stitching shape as the lines on a tennis ball.

The Bat:

One piece smooth round timber (Ash) or stressed aluminium. Length—not more than 42" and maximum diameter 23/4".

Gloves:

The catcher wears a fingerless leather mitt. All other players wear a leather glove (1st baseman sometimes wears a special mitt).

Umpires:


Home Plate Umpire — calls 'pitch' & 'home plate' decisions.
Field Umpires — call 'base' and 'field' decisions.






