WIET THE COMPETITION

National Baseball League (NBL)

ESSEX ARROWS

By virtue of winning the NBL pennant, the Arrows qualified for the finals directly. This means they avoided the perils of the playoffs and have had a weekend to prepare without having to play a competitive game. This may play to their advantage as they can come in well-rested and relaxed, but it could also backfire if they are unable to maintain the momentum they built up at the end of the season.

The Arrows have the regular-season home run leader in Maikel Azcuy Perez with three, but home runs are hard to come by at Farnham Park, which has the same dimensions as Dodger Stadium in the Major Leagues.

LONDON METS

The Mets, had to make it through the playoffs on 24 August to reach the finals. Having finished second in the standings, they only needed to win one game to make it through, but the one-game playoff format has proved to be the undoing of many a team in years past.

The Mets will no doubt look to ride the momentum from this victory into the finals, and while they must assume they will face a sterner test against the Arrows, they can still take confidence from their playoff performance and some good results during the back end of the regular season.

The Mets can counter with some league leaders of their own. Martin Tucker led the league in batting at .525, Pietro Sollecito was the ERA leader at 2.29 and Sollecito and Matt Tarrant were joint pitching win leaders with five each.

CAMBRIDGE ROYALS (Central Division)

Cambridge lined up behind starting pitcher Jonathan Hollis and reliever Doug Grabowski in their quarter-final, with both pitchers shutting down the majority of Liverpool's offense, and they look to be on form coming into the finals weekend.

Jonathan Hollis finished the season with a league-leading ERA of 1.11, closely followed by Doug Grabowski with an ERA of 1.59.

Both pitchers are strong contenders to start the game for Cambridge, although it would not be a surprise if the Royals deployed the same tactic as they did in their quarter-final victory: Hollis to start, Grabowski to come on in relief.

HULL SCORPIONS (North Division)

Gavin Marshall will almost certainly be on the mound for Hull and will make either Hollis or Grabowski work for the win. Marshall was dominant in Hull's quarter-final against Milton Keynes, allowing only one unearned run through nine innings of work. If Marshall keeps this form going, he will give Hull a fighting chance against a very strong Cambridge side.

So neither side will lack pitching, and the game should come down to how they utilise baserunners and scoring opportunities. Both teams will have to hold their nerve and take their chances when they arise. It promises to be a close and absorbing encounter.

And while playoff baseball can be unpredictable, the Metros will be expected to win if they maintain their all-round solid approach, with the propensity to score runs from one to nine in the batting order.

While London came through the last round with ease, the Richmond Knights won a tough extra inning thriller against the Essex Redbacks. The battle-hardened Knights will be hoping this works to their advantage, and they will certainly be full of confidence after playing some high-quality baseball in the last round.

When the Metros score big, teams struggle to keep up, so it is important for Richmond to pitch and defend well. Starter Michael Daykin was excellent against the Redbacks, and a repeat performance on Saturday would certainly put the underdogs in with a chance.

LONDON MAMMOTHS (South Division)


