The clinicians for the 1996 BBF/MLBI Annual Coaching Clinic will primarily be provided by the Houston Astros.

The BBF and MLBI are pleased to announce that Houston Astros manager, Terry Collins, along with Brent Strom, pitching coach of the Tuscon Toros, the Astros AAA affiliate of the Pacific Coast League, will be the main speakers at this years event. They will be assisted by Ralph Rago, the Great Britain manager and the Junior clinic will be run by Alan Ashkinazy from Pony Baseball.

Once again the quality of the speakers is outstanding and hopefully this will assure that the

clinic is another success. Bookings have already started to come in for the event which will take place 19-21 January next year.

Strom has been a pitching coach in the Astros organisation for the last five years and during a career cut short by injury pitched for the New York Mets, Cleveland Indians and the San Diego Padres.

Collins was appointed Astros manager in 1994 and spent the majority of his playing career with the Dodgers. He turned his hand to managing in 1981 and spent much of the 80's managing the Dodgers AAA affiliate, the Albuquerque Dukes.

Ashkinazy played in the Red Sox minor league organisation for four years and coached high school ball for six years. He has been a Pony Baseball coach for the last five years and coached the Greensboro Palomino team to victory in the 1993 World Series.

Rago has coached for thirty five years and most recently for University California Davis where he held the position of Assistant Head Coach and Recruiting Co-ordinator.

There will also be a MLB Umpire present running an umpires clinic at the event and details of this person will be made available as soon as possible.

El Presidente

The season has ended but with many meetings and preparation of the year end accounts for the AGM, the officials of the BBF are continuing to work for the growth of baseball in Great Britain.

Next year the emphasis will be on the push to get our Senior squad out of the B-pool. This must be done for our game to progress, to attract increased funding and most importantly sponsorship. The drive must not stop there as we expect to get into and remain in the A-pool of European baseball. Ralph Rago has outlined his coaching staff for both squads and with camps budgeted for the juniors and cadets it looks like a busy year ahead. Feeling in Europe is that we should be a major playing force and I cannot agree more with that sentiment.

The world of baseball has still yet to make it's decision to allow the participation of professionals into the Olympics. This is still the main contentious issue splitting the main continental confederations of the IBA. The IBA now has 99 members and a probable extra-ordinary congress will be called before the Atlanta games to pave the way for inclusion of the worlds supreme athletes for Sydney in 2000. This seems an easy statement but confusion is still rife that a pre Atlanta vote would mean professionals competing in those games. This is a non-starter and a pre-condition of any vote taking place. So one last time, "There will be no professional players in the 1996 games!"

The congress in Havana was mainly uneventful with the statutes finally being passed by the members. This has

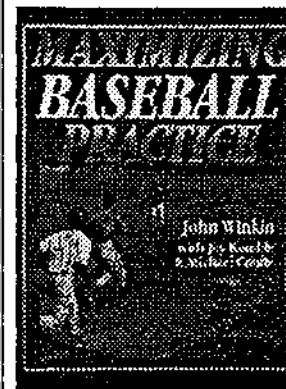
taken far too long to do but the need for an unambiguous document that will stand the test of time is important. With some way to go on the use of the language the basic principles are however sound. Further drafting next congress is expected. Those of you familiar with travel to some foreign climates will know exactly what I mean when I say that for most of the time I had the "Cuban two step" and what with getting sun burnt as well was glad to arrive back home to sunny Sheffield.

Meetings this month include Junior and Senior Leagues, Board, Council and NPL. Preparation for the AGM and the finalising of the European B Championship committees will see most of this year out. The revision of tasks and personnel will continue and I expect a document to be issued to all voting members at the AGM outlining the administration, functions and goals for the next year. Negotiations with MLB, Steve Baker and Clive Russell, for the commencement of the Pitch, Hit and Run program for 1996 are being finalised. This program will go into select schools and be run with local and regional championships. The national finals will be held at a major event in the Autumn giving a high profile and awareness to baseball and our youth programs.

I hope that all your input was submitted to the office for any bye-law considerations as this was your chance to put right your rules. I look forward to seeing everyone at the AGM in December and of course at the Annual Clinic and dinner in January.

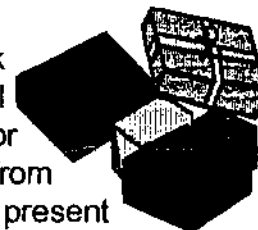

The Perfect Christmas Present

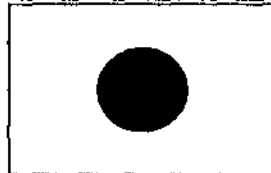

I didn't like the opening ceremony in the heat. I also really disliked some of the food particularly sushi.

I would like to tell you about being chosen to go the World Children's Baseball Fair in Gifu City, Japan.

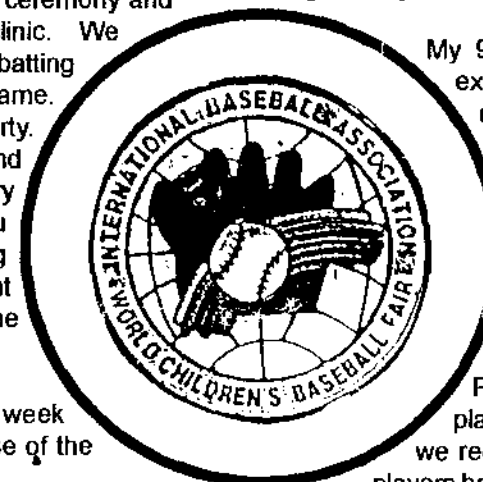

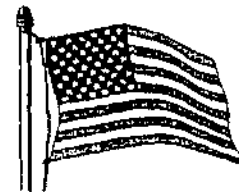
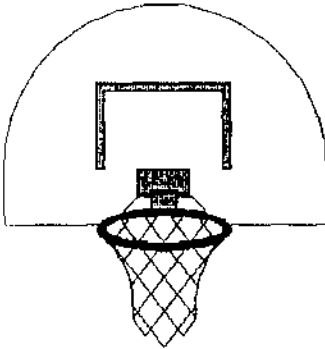

Dear Brit-Ball

With the graded league structure having completed its third season perhaps a few comments, observations and suggestions might be passed on its workings. I doubt if some of my views will find much favour as they cut across decades of British Baseball thinking, but here goes anyway.

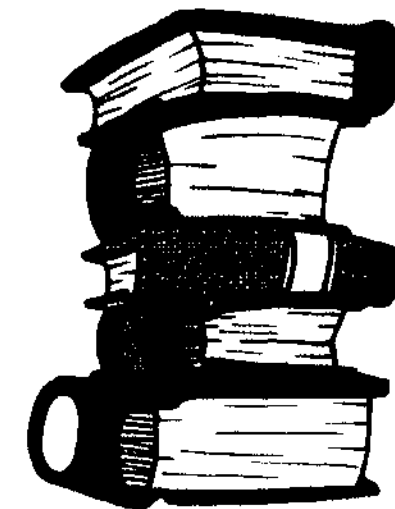
The NPL South nearly always provides games of good standard and judging by league results its the same in the NPL North. I believe standards could have been even higher but for some problems that affect all divisions.

In the lower divisions rising standards of play are much harder to see with often a wide gulf between top and bottom teams. I think withdrawals have not helped here. Promoting extra teams in replacement usually works quite well but relieving very poor teams is often a bad bet as they tend to get worse. In the interests of parity one gets the feeling that teams with a percentage of under two hundred should get relegated.

The practice of voluntary relegations and refusing promotions would seem to act against parity as such teams usually do well enough to suggest their sacrifice was unnecessary; most teams seem prepared to overcome problems at their proper playing level.

I think a standard policy of scheduling at all levels with teams meeting each other 3 or 4 times would improve play in time.

It is puzzling that the southern half of the country - apart from East Anglia - has shown a healthy growth in teams while the northern half has generally remained static or declined. Perhaps the closure of USAF bases in the east counties has been a factor, but it still seems strange that growth remains elusive in the top half.

Finally; a suggestion for getting Scotland more involved in the mainstream. Suppose the Scotland national squad met each NPL North team just once during the season, the results counting in the league for the English clubs. Scotland would not play in the league but if they won at least half their games would take part in the National play-offs. They would still run a separate club league.

As I say, these are personal views of a non BBF person and are not intended in criticism; things can always seem different from the outside. Feel free to chew on and spit out before the AGM!

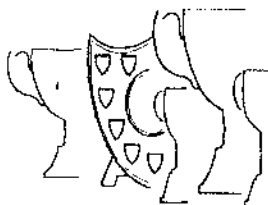
