For a team that had topped the standings from the start of the season, the Angels seemed surprisingly subdued, however the first inning produced the expected tough contest, each teams opening three batters failing to make any impact.

The second inning seemed to be from a different game altogether, producing RBI's for Oliver Heidecker (lf), Richard Kemp (rf) and Alan Bloomfield (c), who's walk with the bases loaded made it 3-0 Warriors. Next man up, Graham Haslam (lb), reached first thanks to a fielding error, adding two further runs scored by Dean Ward (3b), and Harry Atwood (ss).

Angels pitcher, Matthew Poggi, then balked, feigning a throw to first, which advanced Alan Bloomfield to home for 6-0, and Kevin Coldiron promptly batted in Poggi's intended pick-off victim, Graham Haslam, for 7-0.

Poggi helped recover two of the runs conceeded, his walk, followed by a double steal with fellow runner Noel Omechi (ss), was converted into two runs by an Oliver Millett (cf) single, but Warriors claimed another run in the 3rd, Richard Kemp getting his second RBI from two at bats, with a single placed beyond the grasp of Medeo Kamiyama, Angels excellent third baseman.

The top of the fourth saw three consecutive extra base hits for the Warriors producing two more runs. Graham Haslam matched Kevin Coldiron's first inning triple, and was then batted in by Coldirons ground rule double for 9-2. The Warriors second baseman was then caught stealing third, which was a pity, as next man up, Brad Thompson (cf), hit a solo round tripper over the head of his opposite number for 10-2 Warriors. Singles for Oliver Heidecker, Richard Kemp and Alan Smith, loaded the bases, but the only loss,

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then suffered by Poggi was a sacrifice fly from Dean Ward for 11-3.

Angels then imitated the Warriors, with Medeo Kamiyama getting on base, then being caught stealing, followed immediately by a Noel Omechi home-run, that could so easily have been two.

Although the scoreline shows the fifth as a shut-out, it was not short on excitement, with first Angels relief pitcher Tony Dyett, loading up the bases and escaping unscathed, followed by Alan Smith for the Warriors doing the very same thing.

No such joy for the pitchers in the sixth, with an RBI single for Harry Atwood, followed by ground rule doubles for Alan Bloomfield (1 RBI) and Kevin Coldiron (2 RBI's). With the score at 15-3, the seven inning slaughter looked a possibility. Angels fought back though, starting with Noel Omechi's second homer of the day. Tony Dyett added an RBI for 15-5, and was himself batted in by John Swanson (rf) to stave off the slaughter.

Warriors were having none of it though, and RBI's for Dean Ward, Harry Atwood and Graham Haslam put Warriors 18-6 ahead. Alan Bloomfield then stole home plate, and Kevin Coldiron notched another extra base hit with an RBI ground rule double for 20-6 Warriors. Coldiron then took to the hill for the Warriors, and although Noel Omechi reached third base for the Angels, Coldiron finished his brief spell in relief without loss.

A very tense and exciting contest, but sadly one that was marred by an unfortunate accident in the third inning. Spartan's Chris Stein, playing the outfield, was in pursuit of a shallow fly ball. His team mate, Rob Lanario, was also back-pedalling from short. In attempting to make the play, they collided. Stein was knocked unconscious, and in falling, swallowed his tongue. Only rapid reactions from his team mates averted a serious injury, and

although Chris has been discharged from hospital for several days now, he has been advised not to play for the remainder of the season.

Despite this happening, Spartans decided that they would continue the game, but obviously, they must have felt rather distanced from the task at hand, and they could have been forgiven for throwing in their hand altogether when Vince Warner cracked a three run homer in the fifth.

However, Gary Bedingfield replied with a solo homer of his own, and with only two runs seperating the teams, three tense scoreless innings followed. Eagles finally broke the deadlock, Clive Smith's double being converted by Dave Read for the final run of the game.

Last weekend (4/9), Warriors finished their regular season and secured first place with a 21-1 drubbing of the Tonbridge Bobcats. Sadly for the Bobcats, a string of heavy defeats has caused a few of their regular team to quit playing, and although even their best side would find it very hard to beat the Warriors, the weakened line up that came to Barnes, stood no chance at all.

Enfield Spartans went one better in their visit to Marsh Lane. A massive twelve runs scored in the first inning against the Waltham Forest Angels put them on their way to a 22-1 victory. This means that the final regular season game, Waltham Forest Angels at Enfield Spartans, will decide who finishes third, and plays the Essex Eagles away, and who will finish fourth and play the London Warriors away in the play-off semi finals.

They believe that by scrapping the BBF Cup, and instituting a regime of single games home and away, and double-headers, home and away, against each teams prospective opponents, making six meetings in all, there will be enough time to fit in 42 matches.

Bearing in mind the number of single pitcher teams around, and the sheer bloody awfulness of English summers, watching a load of

make-up rain date double-headers in September will be nothing short of a marathon feat of endurance. 20 games is optimum. Be sensible BBF, please!

HISTORY LESSON

IF WE had the space to compile a history of baseball in Britain, we could use the following extract from the Brooklyn Eagle of May 16, 1862:

".... the scheme of establishing the Union Base Ball and Cricket grounds'.... has now been carried into execution. It is a fair specimen of the enterprise of our citizens, this being the first of the kind in Brooklyn. At the Central Park, N.Y., there are ball grounds on the same plan.... and during the past year or two there have been numbers established in London and in other European cities. The chief object of the Association is to provide a suitable place for ball playing, where ladies can witness the game without being annoyed by the indecorous behaviour of the rowdies who attend some of the first-class matches...."

Further to this evidence of baseball in Britain more than 130 years ago, just take a note of this: The Boston Red Stockings and the Philadelphia Athletics played a regular championship baseball game at Lord's in 1874. While they were here the Americans, 18 of them, played 7 cricket matches, each against 12 home players. The Americans won them all.

The striking thing is the parallel development originally of baseball and cricket, as variations upon the same theme.
