So, with four weeks to go, and the top four teams separated by as little as one game, nobody can afford to make the slightest slip.

There is the distinct possibility that the regular season crown will only be decided by the records of individual teams against each other, as there could possibly be a tie in the won/lost records of the top two, or even three teams.

Following on from the regular season, there is still a little uncertainty as to the exact format of the play-offs, as the Essex Eagles take part in an annual tournament in Holland, which may prevent them from being in the play-offs. Whether the Eagles place will be awarded to Tonbridge, or given as a forfeit to their opponents, or whether an opportunity will be found to include Essex Eagles in the play-offs, is not known at this stage. We hope to be able to update you in Issue 11 (11/9), which will be distributed at Saffeld's King George V Playing Fields for the final regular season game for 1994, Spartans vs Waltham Forest Angels.

A glance at the above will show that there was no let-up in the tension that is invariably generated when these teams meet. The uncertainties that bedevil National League baseball, and British baseball in general, did nothing to diminish the anticipation of another nail-biter, and the loyal fans, though few in number, contributed to and enjoyed a magnificent struggle between teams whose skill and application and competitive fervour will surely make an impression on this country before long. That is, if there is any interest at all in sport for the sake of sport. If only people would come and watch a game that has not yet become a medium of the media, or a testing ground for gimmickry ! If the number of people who watched this game at Enfield is the sum total of those interested, it is a sad and distressing reflection, not on the game, but on the millions who call themselves, and are called, sports fans.

The good news that awaited us on arrival at King George V field was that Simon Lanario and Steve Simmons were in the Enfield line-up, having recovered from serious injuries. So both sides were well represented. We had doubts, we must admit, about the Enfield pitching, with neither Rob Nelson nor Julian Fountain available, but there was a surprise in store when a newcomer, Jamie Anderson took over in mid-game with the bases loaded and none out, and retired the Warriors scoreless in convincing style. He then went on to engage in the closing innings in a pitching duel with Gody Cain that was fraught with drama and tension.

The absence, indisposed, of Harry Atwood, could not but raise misgivings in Warriors' fans, but these games inspire such a sense of purpose and teamwork that players are, obviously, willing and able to play anywhere. It was, we think, Kevin Goldiron's first game at shortstop for the Warriors, and we are not likely to forget the

late double play he turned, probable turning the whole game in the process.

After a ball game, recollections stir almost the same degree of excitement and tension in retrospect, as was felt at the time of the action. One picture is, however, to at least one fan, exceptionally vivid - that of Alan Bloomfield, with the ball raising the dust at third base, racing in to score the go-ahead run in the eleventh with a grin as wide as the Mississippi.

A game which appeared to the spectator, to consist of two full teams of base coaches, with players slapping their faces, necks, chests, and vigorously scratching themselves in all kinds of peculiar places. The reason? Ante! Millions of flying wee beasties, causing no end of distraction, particularly to the pitchers.

Warriors started well, with Harry Atwood, back from holiday and a short illness, being batted in by second man up, Alan Bloomfield, with a sacrifice fly. However, Eagles' Vince Warner retired the side without further loss.

Then in the second, singles to left for Alan Smith and Carlos Rodriguez put men on, but with two out. However an RBI single for Dean Ward, a walk for Harry Atwood to load the bases, an RBI single for Alan Bloomfield, and a bases loaded walk for Brad Thompson, put the Warriors 4-0 up.

Then came a huge triple to left centrefield for Cody Cain that would surely have cleared the fence, had it not been burnt in an arson attack earlier in the season, but vigorous fielding by Eagles Matt Jennings in centrefield, limited Cain to a 3 RBI triple, rather than the grand slam that he craved. A small consolation followed for Cody Cain, being batted in by Oliver Heidecker for 3-0 Warriors.

Essex were not going to relinquish their winning streak easily, and with singles for Glenn Spooner (1f), Scott Wright (1f), and Clive Smith (3b), they loaded up the bases. Spooner then managed to steal home plate for 2-1, and a Matt Jennings grounder batted in Wright and Clive Smith for 3-3.

Jennings was then advanced to third by singles from Dave Read (co) and Vince Warner, when Ian Colvin hit a grounder to third. Dean Ward immediately relayed the ball to Alan Bloomfield at the plate, and Bloomfield, Jennings and the ball all came together with a thud at the plate: the umpires decision - safe.

Warriors attempts to extend their 3-4 lead in the third were curtailed by a neat Essex double-play, Harry Atwood's line drive plucked out of the air by Dave Read at shortstop, and relayed to Matt Jennings, now playing first, to beat the retreating Dean Ward to the bag.

The bottom of the fourth brought RBI's for Oliver Heidecker, his double down the leftfield line scoring Brad Thompson, and Alan Smith batting in Cody Cain. With the score at 10-4, Essex pulled back a run in the fifth courtesy of a Vince Warner single, scoring Dave Read from second. Then followed a fairly unique moment, Ian Colvin hit a grounder back at pitcher, Alan Smith, who then initiated the 1-6-3 double-play with Harry Atwood and Cody Cain. The play itself was not so unique, it was the way the Warriors left the diamond with only two down that raised some eyebrows!

Warriors replied in their half with an RBI double from Harry Atwood, a second sacrifice fly from Alan Bloomfield, and a 2 RBI single for Oliver Heidecker, bringing the score to 14-5.

Warriors then opted to bring on reliever Cody Cain for innings 6 through 9, and this inspired Eagles' Vince Warner to contest a scoreless pitching duel. This was only broken in the ninth by Vince Warner himself, hitting a line drive to centrefield to score Matt Jennings and Dave Read.

Cody Cain gained swift revenge, a Todd Cockman grounder to second resulting in a 4-6-3 double play, Carl Blackburn the other Essex victim.

Meanwhile, at Deacons Field, the Tonbridge Bobcats gave a good account of themselves against the Waltham Forest Angels, and although they were to lose 13-1, the Angels lead only built up very slowly, whilst Bobcats frequently put men on base, but lacked the physical power to convert the numerous hits into runs.

What was most pleasing was their good team spirit, which kept throughout, keeping the hit count high, and the error count low.

THE MANNY RUBIN MEMORIAL TROPHY

On Sunday 4th September Baseball South west Teams will meet in the opening round of their cup competition. Semi-finals will be played on 11th September, and the Final and 3rd place consolation games will be played at Crewkerne on the 25th September

Manny Rubin is a name familiar to many in the Plymouth area, especially those with sporting interests. Manny, a veteran of the US Navy Signal Corps, participated in the D-Day landing preparations and the subsequent liberation of Europe. His service stay in England left him with such deep affection for the country that he returned to live and marry after the war.

As well as being a director of Plymouth Argyle Football Club, Manny was also active in re-importing and developing the popularity of his native national game of baseball in Plymouth and in the south west generally. Such was Manny's own popularity and the warmth of local baseball peoples' feelings for him, that when his death sadly occurred earlier this year, it was universally agreed that the region's own baseball league should remember him and his contribution to the game by naming their cup trophy in his memory and honour.

Baseball South West's Cup Final day will also mark the opening of Crewkerne's new, purpose built baseball diamond at Waihan Community School Playing Fields.

BOOK REVIEW

THE ARMCHAIR CONDUCTOR, by Dan Carlinsky and Ed Goodgold. Published by Titan Books, London. £5.99.

THE sub-title of this book is *How to Lead a Symphony Orchestra in the Privacy of Your Own Home*. So what is this review doing in a baseball magazine? This back page is known to be free from editorial restraint, but there must be a limit. The book under review originated in the U.S.A., but even so readers will be inclined to doubt any connection between Bach and Ball, even in America. Therefore perhaps a few extracts may be surprising and revealing.

The strike zone for the tip of the baton is a rough square on a vertical plane about eighteen inches in front of you, covering an area a foot and a half or so to either side of your shirt buttons, from your waist to the top of your head....

What do you do when a piece of music is just too fast to mark every beat with your baton...?



Pretend it's in 1-beat....

Can you beat that?

If you Armchair-Conduct a piece with a soloist, remember that the conductor always works with the orchestra but keeps an eye on the soloist. So give an occasional glance over your left shoulder, like a left-handed pitcher in a stretch position trying to pick a runner off second base....
