

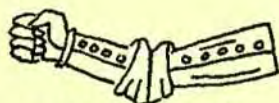

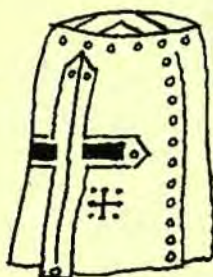

Unfortunately, the greatly reduced quantity has diminished the impact of a quite thrilling season, and thoughts about the future structure of the game in this country have loomed over all concerned with the sport, taking the edge off an extraordinary seasons' play.

Certainly one thing to be glad of is that this fourth National League Championship Final features a new finalist, the Waltham Forest Angels. Whilst the previous three contests between London Warriors (aka Athletics) and Enfield Spartans, have all been exciting games, the introduction of a new face shows that National League has encouraged and promoted the skill level in other teams, rather than being a contest run merely for the benefit of either Spartans or Warriors.

There has been a lot of pleasure derived from this National League season, there has been a lot to concern us too, but one thing we can be sure of, we'll remember this season for many years to come.

This final game of the regular season should have, by rights, been some kind of formality. Both teams had qualified for the play-offs. Both teams were nominally going to be the away side in the play off matches, and all that was really at stake was would they be away at London Warriors, who had beaten both of them twice, or away at the Essex Eagles, equally capable of beating both of them. However, much to the delight of the fans, both sides went out to play to win !

Angels were back at almost full strength, with only Mick Moseley and Bucky O'Hare missing from the usual starting line-up. The visitors started brightly, with lead-off man Takao Imura coming home on a dropped third strike taking play to first. In the home half of the inning Angel's Tony Dyett took time to settle in, and by the fourth Enfield batter, he was facing bases loaded.

Darren Cobb batted in Steve Simmons with a single, Chris Stein walked to score Rob Lanario, and Simon Lanario added another RBI single, brother Ian crossing the plate. Justin Hornet hit the fourth Enfield RBI, batting in Darren Cobb for 4-1 Enfield.

The top of the second also saw the bases loaded, Spartans pitcher Rob Nelson, looking a little troubled. Medeo Kamiyama batted in the only Angels run this inning, Nelson being bailed out by an alert fielding display. Takao Inamura hit a fly ball to centrefield, which was caught by Ian Lanario, who quickly rifled the ball to Chris McGovern at second, beating Imura to the tag up for a neat double-play.

Enfield forged further ahead in the bottom of the second with an RBI double for Ian Lanario, and a second RBI in 2 at bats for Darren Cobb to make it 6-2 Spartans.

Although the third inning was scoreless, there was still plenty to enthral. Waltham's Noel Omechi and Mark McCrory had opportunities to consider what might have been, both being caught between bases. In the bottom of the third, Steve Simmons watched from the batters box as his fly ball looped towards the fence running along the foul territory at first, and saw the nimble Takao Imura scale the fence and glove the ball for a spectacular catch.

The fifth inning brought about a revival from the Angels, doubles for Kamiyama and McCrory (RBI), where both converted to runs by singles from Takao Inamura and Daniel Namorah. Namorah then escaped a run down by seemingly ignoring everybody's advice, and was then batted in for the tying run by Shozi Vozumi.

Enfield regained the lead in the bottom of the fifth, Simon Lanario batting in Darren Cobb with a single, but the 7-6 lead was short lived. Tony Dyett got on base with a single in the top of the seventh, and consecutive ground-outs for Imura and Kamiyama brought him home to tie up the game once more, and conclude Rob Nelson's spell on the hill.

Ian Lanario's spell in relief in the seventh had an inauspicious start, walking the first batter, Noel Omechi, who then stole second and third bases, and then scored, when catcher Rob Lanario, whisked a ball down the leftfield line out of the reach of Justin Hornet at third.

Angels forged further ahead with an RBI for Takao Inamura to make it 9-7 Waltham, but Enfield were not about to give in. In the bottom of the inning, first two men up, Chris McGovern and Steve Simmons, were both walked, prompting the Angels manager, Mike Agha, to visit the hill, and call on reliever, Nao, to close for the Angels.

Rob Lanario then reached first on a fielders choice, McGovern out at third, and Ian Lanario batted in Steve Simmons to make it 9-8 Waltham, and make the ninth inning a real nailbiter. Both relieving pitchers worked well, keeping both offences off base, and giving Waltham Forest the narrowest of victories.

This Championship Play-Off semi final ensured that it would not be a fourth consecutive London & Enfield Championship Final, but it did reproduce all the tension and drama of those previous three thrilling contests.

The top of the first alone produced action galore, with a walk and stolen base for first man up, Chris McGovern, followed by a bunt for Steve Simmons to put men on the corners. Gary Bedingfield then hit a grounder to Alan Smith, who initiated the 1-6-3 double play, Harry Atwood and Cody Cain teaming up to put out Simmons and Bedingfield, with McGovern reaching home simultaneously. Rob Lanario then extended Enfield's lead to 2-0, batting in Ian Lanario.

Warriors replied in the bottom of the second with the bases loaded. Dean Ward hit a grounder to third, and Oscar Marcellino's overthrow to first allowed Kevin Coldiron and Oliver Heidecker to score for 2-2.

Two tense, scoreless innings followed, culminating in a moment of controversy in the bottom of the fourth. Warrior's Oliver Heidecker struck a grounder down the left line, which he managed to stretch to a double with a head first slide to the bag his fellow countryman, Jurgen Klinsmann, would have envied ! This was followed by a grounder to short by Richard Kemp. The runner, Heidecker, fielder, Rob Lanario, and struck ball, all converged on the base path, and protests about interference seemed initially to draw two different calls from the umpires. After consultation and clarification of the call at issue, interference was given, and Heidecker called out.

The top of the fifth saw London introduce releiver Cody Cain, Alan Smith moving to first base. Cain added a further shut-out innings to Smith's previous three, and then scored in the bottom of the inning, courtesy of a Kevin Coldiron double. Oliver Heidecker then extended London's lead to 4-2 with an RBI single. (cont page 6)

(continued from page 4) Cody Cain pitched another shut-out in the sixth, and battery-mate Alan Bloomfield added another insurance run with a sacrifice fly, Dean Ward running in London's fifth and final run.

After five scoreless innings, Ian Lanario stopped the Enfield drought, his single to short batting in pinch runner Rob Yuille, but at the expense of Gary Bedingfield, out at second. Oscar Marcellino then reduced the deficit to just one run, batting in Chris McGovern with a double to centrefield.

An expensive error for the Warriors proved to be the turning point in the eighth. Spartans substitute first baseman, Amos Begum, in his first plate appearance for the game, got three strikes against him, but the ball was dropped, and the overthrown, converting a potential out into two bases. This produced the tying run, courtesy of a Steve Simmons RBI single.

Gary Bedingfield then hit a single to short, and although Steve Simmons was out at second, the throw to first was wild, Chris McGovern scoring to put Spartans 6-5 ahead.

Enfield added a further run in the ninth, Marcellino hitting a triple to centrefield, and then being batted in by a well placed Rob Nelson sac bunt.

Warriors tried to fight back, with both Kevin Coldiron and Alan Bloomfield in scoring positions, but the converting hit never came, and it was Enfield, not London, who made it four consecutive National League Finals.

There was staggering news from the other play-off semi final. Despite numerous calls to National League members during the preceding week enthusing about the prospect of playing the semi-final, Essex Eagles pulled out on the Saturday, unable to raise a team, effectively given Waltham Forest a bye to the finals. With much of the Essex membership in the retail trade, one wonders whether Sunday opening, and the resulting commercial pressures, is really such a neat idea after all.
