Humberside County Council is sponsoring the tournament. Each of the visiting teams is to bring an umpire. The Great Britain umpire will be Ted Thesingh.

Hull Giants drew Nottingham teams in the next round.

NORTH WEST AMERICAN BASEBALL – SOFTBALL ASSOCIATION

We started with high hopes for the entry, for the first time in a number of years, of a seventh team in our local league. This team was to have consisted of Venezuelans resident in the North West who had played a couple of friendly games last season. Their embassy in London had promised them financial assistance which would have in -cluded equipment and uniforms. Due to elections in Venezuela caus -ing a change of government, these promises regarding baseball were temporarily forgotten, and the Venezuelan team withdrew just before our season started.

Since then the Embassy has decided to make amends, and has pres -ented the NWBL with a very expensive and handsome medallion The Simon Bolivar Trophy; this is to be competed for annually be -tween a Venezuelan All Star team and a North West All Star team. A three game series to decide the winner for 1984 has been arranged.

The Venezuelan Embassy has also provided individual awards for

our Pony League Champions.

At senior level, we still have our six reliables, and with Burtonwood U.S. Army, and Skelmersdale having started the season in grand style, Trojans' seven year strangle hold is now in peril.

At Pony level we have enjoyed unexpected success. At the end of 1983 we were down to one team; a concentrated effort by Messrs.

Bennett, Lawler, Foster, Dulson, Tracy, Swift, Wells, Hugh King and several newcomers resulted in a tremendous increase in inter—est. This has led to the formation of a five team league, with the prospect of two extra teams at a later date. Skelmersdale in particular has produced a terrific response, three of the Pony League teams are based in Skelmersdale. Due to the newcomers al—ready mentioned we have had remarkable success in obtaining equip—ment from the most unthought of places.

Whereas Ponyball has made great strides forward, the same cannot be said of Ladies Softball. Although there are still three teams, Litherland High School has decided not to play outside the school programme they operate. This decision stems from a dispute last year when there was an objection against them using male players

in league matches.

The Jets and the Blue-Caps are still keen, but two teams can hardly form a league, and cost has ruled out very much travelling. All that these two teams have is a series of games between them -selves. It is to be hoped that they will adopt the attitude of the Pony League, and permit teams to enter a competition if and when they are formed.

To conclude we have arranged a number of All Star games in addition to the series versus the Venezuelan All Stars. We have also arranged a couple of games at Stretford in an attempt re-

introduce the sport there.

The North West All Stars played the Great Britain team at Burtonwood Army Base on 24th. June. We were beaten by the G.B. team 11 - 0. We have an All Star game arranged to be played at the Liverpool International Garden Festival on 30th. September.

A VISIT TO CARDIFF.

On July 1st. I was able to see the annual international game be -tween Wales and England on T.V. twice. In the afternoon BEC- Wales screened a 50 minute edited version of the game, played the day be -fore. The game, played on the Civil Service Sports Ground, Newport, had lasted for just short of 90 minutes; so a 50 minutes version was able to cover all the action. In the evening on S4C & Welsh language version was screened, this lasted for 40 minutes. Again it seemed to cover all the action, it was just more tightly edited.

An interesting point about the game, won by Wales, after two successive victories by England, was that in addition to the main sponsor, Welsh Brewers(a subsidiary of Bass, Charrington); the Welsh Baseball Union had a secondary sponsor, Balan Sports. This firm, which retails sports equipment, supplied a set of kit for Wales, the shirts carried the words Balan Sports prominently on the chest. In fact as far as camera coverage was concerned, Balan Sports appeared to do better than Welsh Brewers, who relied as usual on signs place around the perimeter of the field. I wonder whether Welsh Brewers, or on Merseyside next year, Bass North West, will insist on exclusive sponsorship rights: in which case Wales may well play with a brand of beer emblazoned on the chests of the players.

The leading Welsh club, Llanrumney Y.C., have also obtained shirt sposorship, they play in strip advertising Howells Motors, Austin -Rover. Another club, Old Illtydians, I am told is sponsored by

Allied Irish Banks.

OLYMPIC BASEBALL.
As Cuba has withdrawn from the Olympic Games, the Dominican Rep -ublic has come into the tournament; additionally the I.O.C. has granted permission for the format to be enlarged from a six to an eight team set-up. Japan and Canada have therefore joined the tour -nament, the others are U.S.A., Italy, Taiwan, South Korea, and Nicaragua.
