

book review

- 'THE COMPLETE BASEBALL HANDBOOK' by Walter Alston. 530pp. £39.95
- 'THE ELIAS BASEBALL ANALYST' £11.95
- 'BILL JAMES BASEBALL ABSTRACT' £8.95
- 'THE BASEBALL ENCYCLOPAEDIA' (Ed. Joseph Reichler) 2733pp. £34.95

There are, of course, hundreds of coaching manuals on baseball, but none so detailed or meticulous, so deeply knowledgeable, as Walter Alston's 'The Complete Baseball Handbook'. There are probably none so expensive either, but an investment in this book will mean that you won't ever need another. Twenty three years a manager of the Brooklyn and LA Dodgers, Alston's pedigree is sound and his style clear and easy to read. He may be a little out of date with current baseball fashions, but the very fact that the book is still in print after so many years says something in itself.

Under the heading 'non-fiction' comes the welter of books on the politics, sociology and aesthetics of baseball, those deploring the perceived changes in the game, those praising them, and those seeking merely to explain them. Then there are statistics. Baseball, more than any other sport, revels in statistics. There are thousands of different categories and combinations - new ones are invented every year. A minor industry makes a full time living out of collecting, analysing and publishing baseball statistics. The most notable annuals are the Elias Baseball Analyst, which delves a little deeper than usual into the standard stats and devotes a page to each regular major leaguer, and the highly alternative Bill James Baseball Abstract, in which James invents complex formulae in an often controversial attempt to get at what really reflects a player's utility in a given situation. Both books are good reference material and, with James at least, very wittily written. But the bible, the Wisden of baseball, is Macmillan's 'Baseball Encyclopaedia'. This is nearly three thousand pages of basic data, year-by-year and career stats for every player who ever played in the majors, plus record holders and details of every World Series. Again not cheap, but, like Wisden, it can be browsed endlessly.

Twenty one year-old Darrin Ward threw a fine 2 hit shutout past the Dodgers, to give the Bluejays a 4-2 record on the year. Ward faced only two batters over the minimum, and struck out eleven. John Stevens put in a fine performance as catcher to make the Bluejay battery virtually unhittable. Phil Lang drove in two of the 'Jays four runs in the first with a single to left; in the second, following a walk to Stevens, a single by Kevin Sylvester, a double by Keith Wilesmith, and a triple by Ward in succession brought in three runs, and the Bluejays had a seven run lead. In the fourth, Keith Wilesmith slammed a massive two run homer to left. Ward's total dominance can be measured by the fact that no ball reached the outfield, either in the air or on the ground.

Rosehill Park, June 14.

Catcher Rick D'Alesandro's RBI single in the bottom of the ninth tied the game, and his suicide squeeze bunt in the 11th plated the winning run as the Braves fought back to a hard-earned victory over Barnes. D'Alesandro was the star of the game, going 6 for 6 with 6 RBI's. Pitcher Andy Evans, who worked all 11 innings, had 5 hits. Barnes spotted Sutton 3 early unearned runs, two on D'Alesandro's first inning two out single, the other on 2b Alan Bloomfield's two out double in the second. But the 'Stormers fought back and finally took the lead in the sixth when, again with two out, Muir Mackean raced home on a short passed ball. It was 6-4 Barnes in the 7th when D'Alesandro tripled in two more runs and then scored himself on an infield out for a 7-6 Braves advantage. Barnes came right back in their half of the 8th to take the lead on three hits, the last a clutch two out, two run double to left by 2b Tony Raffaelli. Raffaelli had 4 hits and 4 RBI's in his BBFS debut. D'Alesandro banged a roller that snuck through the hole to right to tie the game in the Braves' ninth. Raffaelli tripled in the tenth, but was thrown out at home on an infield grounder. Barnes stranded another man at third in the eleventh. Sutton finally pushed across the winning tally in their 11th when Evans singled, stole second, went to third on an infield error & scored on a perfectly executed squeeze bunt by that man again, Rick D'Alesandro. Jason Godfrey was outstanding in 10½ innings of pitching for Barnes, limiting the hard-hitting Braves to five earned runs, and, more remarkably, walking none. Of his 147 pitches, 108 were strikes (76%). Major league pitchers only rarely exceed this percentage.

With the 'Blazers bats blazing and helped by some tight pitching from Michael Dundas, the away side took an early lead which they were to hold for the entire game despite a 14 run hitting spree from the Roadrunners in their third inning. A pitching change in the fourth brought some fast outs from the Blazers' reliever Ian Martin. The fourth, fifth and sixth innings were relatively quiet due to some excellent fielding from the Roadrunners, including a very slick double play and an incredible diving catch from the Roadrunners shortstop. In the top of the seventh with one out and two on, Matt Cook came to the plate for the Trailblazers and drilled a 3 run homer to left field, at which point Totteridge took control of the game and ran out winners by 17 runs.

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PRESIDENT'S PIECE

Every fortnight, BBFS President Don Ferguson will write on issues of importance to the League.

Ever since I've been involved in British baseball, I have been aware of something going on during most of our games which is nothing to do with the game. Any sport can lead to tension and confrontation - that is the nature of competition. But the level of tension in many of our games, which detracts from everyone's enjoyment, is caused by the need many players feel to taunt, mock and distract the opposition. A little bit of jockeying is normally tolerated in baseball leagues around the world, but the constant bickering that goes on over here needs to stop.

There is in fact a rule of baseball that is consistently waived in the hope that players will stick to its spirit, if not quite always its letter. That rule is 4.06(a):

"No manager, player, substitute shall at any time, whether from the bench, the coach's box or on the playing field, or elsewhere -


- (1) Use language which will in any manner refer to or reflect upon opposing players, an umpire, or any spectator;
- (2) Call 'Time' or employ any other word or phrase or commit any act while the ball is alive and in play for the obvious purpose of trying to make the pitcher commit a balk..."

It is my view, and the view of the executive, that more bad feeling has been caused between competing teams through players ignoring this rule than for any other single reason. Widespread abuse of the spirit of the rule has led us to enforce its letter rigidly and throughout the league.

This means that no player may talk to, or, within earshot, about an opposing player, directly or indirectly, for the duration of the game. The rule also prohibits base runners clapping hands or doing anything at all to put off the pitcher. Offenders will first be warned and, if persistent, will be ejected.

Umpires will be instructed to remind teams of the rule before games start. Some leniency may be exercised until players get out of old habits but essentially the rule is firm.

I hope you will appreciate the thinking behind this ruling - I have experimented with it in games I have umpired and generally found it very effective. Please help us to concentrate on playing baseball.



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LETTER

Dear Muir,

Well done on taking the initiative and producing a long needed Southern magazine in order to keep all the members informed of the state of the teams etc.

As an ex 2nd Division player, I should like to say through Grand Slam how impressed I have been with the standard of presentation shown by all the 3rd Division teams I have so far met. The most noticeable general feature is the fact that all these teams have been fully uniformed and have made a really big effort on their fields. Individual niceties were the programmes produced by Bournemouth, which even listed the names of visiting players; the bunting around the entrance and chairs for the visitors, and the cheerleaders, at Burgess Hill; the never-say-die spirit of Croydon Bluejays II even when they were 21 runs behind. What a pleasure it is to play baseball under these conditions. Perhaps some teams in the higher divisions might take a leaf from the book of these teams?

A team of retired Old Timers versus a Team comprising the nine oldest current players. As far as the former team is concerned I have seen during this season alone four venerable gentlemen who fall into the category.

King Harold is reputedly buried in the Abbey grounds and the team took its name from the weapon that slayed the monarch in 1066. An American game played in such an Anglo-Saxon town may seem a strange combination, but this is mainly due to Waltham resident and club founder, Lewis Courtney. Louis is primarily responsible for all of the initial achievements of the club including obtaining tremendous assistance from the local council in establishing the diamond in Townmead. Over the years, Townmead has become one of the finest baseball fields in Southern England with its permanent backstop, dirt basepaths, and fully standard pitcher's mound. The ground also boasts attractive changing rooms, conveniences and hot showers!

The team's playing ability improved dramatically in the spring of 1985 with the introduction of a couple of Americans, whose playing and coaching experience has proved to be invaluable. The club's current membership of 19 fully registered players contains one American.

Financially, the club is self-sufficient, with most of the income coming from Christmas raffles. Club membership this year is £25. Over £500 has already been spent this year on equipment etc.,. The Arrows future looks good; the team spirit is excellent. The club's record in the last two years is 23-4, and it is hoped that a continuation of this success can steer the Arrows into the First Division



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
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
